About us ...



What do we do?

Our dinner meetings feature quest speakers and have included elected officials. Veterans office administrators, law enforcement officials and representatives from national headquarters. At our April meeting, cash awards are presented to the programs at Lehigh University Army ROTC, William Allen High School Navy Junior ROTC, Dieruff High School Air Force Junior ROTC. Wilson High School Army JROTC and Panther Valley High School Army Junior ROTC. Our chapter also provides MOAA medals to top cadets and second lieutenant bars to newly commissioned officers through the Lehigh University Army ROTC program. At our November meeting chapter members donate gifts for the Marine Reserve's Toys for Tots program. We also send thank you cards and other needed items to troops serving throughout the world.

Our legislative goals

Our chapter, working with the state Council of Chapters, was successful in adding MOAA to the State Veterans Commission, which is the primary advisory board on veterans' issues to the State Adjutant General and governor. We are also in favor of creating a separate state department for veterans affairs. We have an active Legislative Affairs Committee, which promotes various bills in the state house and senate and meets with various veterans organizations to coordinate support for statewide legislative initiatives.

Who can join ...

Chapter membership is open to anyone who holds or has ever held a commission or warrant in any component of the Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard, U.S. Public Health Service or National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and their surviving spouses. Dues are free for the first year and \$25 annually thereafter. Our chapter also has associate members, who are surviving spouses of all members, plus widows and widowers of any deceased individuals who would, if living, be eligible for membership; and honorary members, who are immediate family members of any Lehigh Valley officer or warrant officer who dies from combat related injuries. MOAA's national effort

MOAA's mission is to foster fraternal relations among retired, active, reserve, and former officers of the uniformed services; to protect the rights and interests of personnel of the uniformed services and their dependents and survivors; to provide useful services for members and their dependents and survivors, and to serve our community and the nation.

MOAA accomplishes this by lobbying Congress on legislation affecting the career force, the retired community and veterans of the uniformed services. As a tax-exempt veterans organization it advocates issues but cannot by law support any political party or the election or defeat of any political candidate. MOAA has more than 350,000 members worldwide representing the five armed services, the U.S. Public Health Service and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. It is the nation's fifth largest veteran's organization.
